

Location

Chief Atahm School is located on the Adams Lake Reserve #4, across the South Thompson River bridge from Chase, B.C. approximately 55 km east of Kamloops and 52 km west of Salmon Arm.



Driving From the East (from Salmon Arm to Chase)

Travel 50 km west on the Trans-Canada Hwy #1 from Salmon Arm. Turn right onto Shuswap Ave to enter Chase. Continue on Shuswap Ave for 1.2 km, then turn right onto Pine St. Follow Pine Street for 1.3 km, cross the bridge, and take the road to the left. After 400 metres, turn right, then take a quick left into the parking lot. The conference opening will be held in the large gymnasium building.

Driving From the West (from Kamloops to Chase)

Travel approx. 52 km east on the Trans-Canada Hwy #1 from Kamloops. Turn left off the highway into Chase (near the A&W exit) via Shuswap Ave. Continue on Shuswap Ave for 2.5 km, then turn left onto Pine St. Continue on Pine St for 1.3 km, cross the bridge, and take the road to the left. After 400 metres, turn right, then take a quick left into the parking lot. The conference opening will be held in the large gymnasium building.

Dr. Kathryn Michel Language Instructor

Dr. Kathryn Michel has worked extensively in the area of community language revitalization and Indigenous language immersion education. She is one of the founding parents of Chief Atahm School, a Secwépemc language immersion program in 1991 on the Adams Lake Reserve near Chase, BC. Dr. Michel holds a Doctorate in Education from UBC and a Master of Arts in Education degree from SFU. She has written, edited and published numerous language curriculum resources for use in Secwepemc immersion classrooms. In 2013, she developed the "First Nations Language Essentials" curriculum guides for use in language programs in First Nations Schools across BC. Currently she is lead instructor for R Stselxméms r Secwépemc Institute language programs through NVIT and UBCO.



Seth Armitage Language Instructor

Seth is a former Chief Atahm School student who is currently enrolled in UBC's Master of Arts in Educational Technology. He currently teaches in Chief Atahm School's post-secondary partner institute, R Stselxméms r Secwépemc in the Adult Language Fluency Programs through NVIT and UBCO. Callie Hill is Turtle Clan, Kanyen'kehà:ka, and is a lifetime resident of Kenhtè:ke. She is the Chief Executive Officer of Tsi Tyónnheht Onkwawén:na Language and Cultural Centre (TTO) since 2004 and has dedicated much of her professional life to revitalizing Kanyen'kéha for the benefit of her community and the Mohawk Nation.

Callie has a Master of Education Degree in Indigenous Language Revitalization from the University of Victoria. She continues to be a learner of the Mohawk language. Callie will speak about the language revitalization that began over 30 years ago when a group of parents from Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory came together to create ways to raise their children so they could learn and honour their language and culture. Through this goal many speakers have been born. This spirit of language awakening continues as construction of their new Kenhtè:ke Language and Cultural Centre is scheduled to begin.

1A. Using Stories to Teach Language to Children and Adults

Janice E. Billy

Discover the power of TPRS in this engaging and interactive workshop presented by master TPRS teacher Janice E. Billy. TPRS is a fun-filled story-based method that helps language learners acquire fluency naturally through comprehensible input. In this session, participants will:

- Learn the core principles of TPRS, including circling, personalization, and storytelling techniques.
- Experience a live demonstration of TPRS in action.
- Explore how to create engaging stories to maximize language acquisition.
- Gain practical strategies for adapting traditional stories to TPRS units aimed at different proficiency levels and classroom settings.

Whether you are new to TPRS or looking to refine your skills, Janice is sure to leave you with the tools and the motivation to make language learning more effective, engaging, and enjoyable for your students.

1C. Designing Intensive Language Programs for Adult Learners Kathryn Michel 1D. Training the Ears and Eyes for Language Stacey Michel

This workshop is designed for educators and program developers who want to create impactful intensive language programs for adult learners. Participants will explore best practices for curriculum design, teaching methodologies, and strategies that maximize language acquisition in both face-to-face and online learning environments. Dr. Michel will cover key elements such as, structuring one and two year programming, designing lessons that build understanding of core language structures, and, how to integrate real-world communication tasks. This Workshop will focus on:

- Frameworks for intensive language program design
- Strategies for adult learner engagement and motivation

1B. Slexlexéye: Developing an Immersion Reading Program

L. Orton, E. Colgate

This workshop focuses on creating reading programs within language immersion settings. Chief Atahm School staff will share the primary reading program that has been created to foster literacy development while maintaining immersion program goals. This workshop will cover:

Immersion Reading Goals: Examine how reading instruction in immersion can be effectively introduced while maximizing exposure to the language.

Developing Culturally Relevant Materials: The challenges and successes of creating reading materials that are culturally relevant and that support literacy and language acquisition goals.

Literacy Approaches: Integrate whole language practices, such as read-aloud sessions, with phonemic letter-sound practice.

Assessing and Supporting Diverse Learners: Explore assessment tools and strategies to support all learners.

In this workshop, Stacey Michel, will demonstrate her exciting methods for teaching the sounds and pronunciation of Indigenous languages. This comprehensive workshop is designed for language educators and learners who are looking for strategies to improve pronunciation and letter-sound

identification leading to literacy.

Key Workshop Objectives:

- Gain insights into how gaining an "ear" for the unique speech sounds of a language will help in the development of pronunciation and speaking.
- Letter-Sound Identification: Ways of introducing students to decoding writing for languages in a fun and accessible way that helps students experience success.
- Pronunciation Teaching Techniques: Learn practical methods to teach pronunciation, focusing on easy to follow articulation strategies

1E. First Peoples Workshop TBA

The First Peoples' Cultural Council (FPCC) administers the First Peoples' Heritage, Language and Culture Program. The mandate of FPCC is to assist B.C. First Nations in their efforts to revitalize their languages, arts, cultures and heritage.

The vision of FPCC states: First Nations languages, arts, cultures and heritage in B.C. are thriving. The knowledge and worldviews expressed through First Nations languages, arts, cultures and heritage are valued as essential to our collective well-being and human rights.

2A. Mapping Our Language

Robert Matthew, M.Ed, B.Ed & Lawrence Michel

Our traditional lands are alive with local stories, practices, relationships, and memories. The process of cultural mapping is a way for us to define our places of importance. As outlined in UNESCO's Decade of Indigenous Languages, cultural mapping is one method for focussing a communities attention on the protection of language and the use of language names for their lands. In this workshop, educator Rob Matthew and Elder Lawrence Michel will demonstrate some introductory experiences designed to help children in our immersion classrooms connect to nature and to the rich cultural heritage embedded in place. Key goals of Mapping Our Language are to:

- 1. Foster respect for the land and knowledge of land processes
- 2. What is important to know?
- 3. What stories or teachings are connected to key locations in and around our community?
- 4. How has the land around our community changed over time?

2C. Use of Technology in Language Learning

Seth Armitage & Aaron Leon

This workshop will be facilitated by two fathers who are committed to language revival for their own families and their nation. The workshop aims to explore the role of interactive technology in teaching and learning Indigenous languages. Participants will be able to deepen their knowledge and/or skills of current technological tools through practice and through hands-on activities. This workshop will showcase some of the digital tools used to teach language both in-person and online and there will be a demonstration of immersive digital experiences and other technological teaching and learning innovations. Participants will leave with activities, resources, and practice using some of the interactive platforms presented to them.

Participants are encouraged to bring their own laptop or tablet to the presentation. Some ipads will be available for use.

2B. Building Language Leaders in the Language Nest

Laura Michel, Candice Day, Kathryn Michel

Chief Atahm School's language nest was started in 1987 inspired by the Te Kohanga Reo movement of the Maori in New Zealand. For many decades we were fortunate to have dedicated mother tongue speaking Elders to surround the babies with language. For the last few years, we have been staffing our nest with those who have learned the Secwépemc language as adults. Our language nest team is made up of one advanced-level speaker who had worked for many years with the Elders, and three language nest workers who do the bulk of the administrative and daily tasks such as childcare and cooking. As it is essential that each staff member be committed to the immersion environment, we have provided language training for staff in addition to their work at the nest. Without this commitment to maintaining an "all Secwépeme language environment" it is too easy for English to creep into the nest. In this workshop, we will share some strategies of how to build and maintain an English-free language nest environment, even if your staff is still learning the language themselves.

2D. Dream-Making: History of Language Revitalization in Tyendinaga

Callie Hill

Tsi Tyónnheht Onkwawén:na (TTO) was established in 2000 by a group of community members concerned with the revitalization of the Mohawk language in Tyendinaga. Their name means "keeping the words alive". Their language programming include a nursery program, a Mohawk immersion elementary school, an adult learning program, and other community resources. They are a not-for-profit organization that serves the Tyendinaga community and all of those seeking to learn about their proud culture. Callie will expand on her keynote by sharing some of the creative ways they are raising their children while honouring their culture and growing many new speakers. This spirit of language awakening continues as construction of their new Kenhtè:ke Language and Cultural Centre is scheduled to begin.

Rainbow Cady works as a language teacher in Chief Atahm School's preschool immersion classroom. Rainbow has completed Simon Fraser University Language Proficiency Diploma in Secwepemctsín for Eastern Dialect. She is currently enrolled in Year Three Secwepemc Fluency Courses through UBCO. She brings a passion for learning language and a love of working with children into her teaching.

Charli Fortier

Language Instructor

Charli Fortier is the Language Manager for Simpcw. As the Language Manager, Charli has taught the Simpcw Language and Culture Staff credited courses through Simon Fraser University and is the main instructor the Simpcw cohort for the Language Proficiency Certificate in Secwepemctsín. She works closely with Elders within the Secwépemc Nation to elicit, translate and transcribe the language.

Matthew Jones

Language Student

Matthew is a former student of Chief Atahm School who has gone on to expand his language through working with his mother in the Mentor-Apprenticeship Program (MAP). He is currently a student in the Simon Fraser University Language Proficiency Certificate in Secwepemctsín for Eastern Dialect.

Ada Jules

Immersion Language Teacher

Ada Jules is a proud Secwepemc educator from Adams Lake Band. She holds a Secwepemc Language Immersion Proficiency Diploma and a Bachelor of Education from the University of Victoria. A former student of Chief Atahm School, Ada now teaches Grade 4 immersion at Chief Atahm, where she is dedicated to fostering language revitalization and cultural learning.

Allie Louis

Language Instructor

Allie is a former student at Chief Atahm School and worked for many years as a teaching assistant. Currently Allie is an instructor for Simon Fraser University Language Proficiency Certificate in Secwepemctsín for Eastern Dialect, a joint project between Neskonlith Band and Wumec r Cqweqwelutn-kt Community Society.

Jada Michel

Language Educational Support

Jada has completed her Secwepemctsín Proficiency Diploma through Simon Fraser University and is currently enrolled in Year Three of the Secwepemc Language Fluency Program at UBCO. 3A. Making a Survival Shelter Robert Matthew & Lawrence Michel

In this hands-on workshop, Robert Matthew and Elder Lawrence Michel, will guide participants through a shelterbuilding unit including the theory and practice of shelter building in various situations and building emergency shelters using natural materials.

Participants will gain knowledge about types of shelters for a wide variety of outdoor scenarios. The workshop facilitators will guide you through some theory and vocabulary, demonstrating how to teach basic survival skills to language learners of all levels. Participants will also be provided with opportunities to try out their skills of locating a shelter and selecting a type of shelter to construct, based on the available resources.

3C. Interior Salish Wetland Weaving Catherine Pierre

Learn from Secwepemc/syilx weaver and cultural worker Catherine Pierre who offers a mixed media doll making workshop that includes both Cattails and Tule Wetlands plants with a variety of materials to embellish your own weaving. Catherine brings substantial experience as a learner and teacher. She lives within her traditional territory in the beautiful Okanagan valley and is active in arts and cultural revitalization of her syilx culture. In this workshop each participant will be able to take home their weaving project.

3B. Me7 kukuwétmet ell xqe7wellentiye te skwenllq ell meláme: Plant/Medicine Walk Lisa Orton & Denise Sellars

Join Lisa and Denise Sellars for a guided plant identification walk that weaves together language, cultural teachings, and land-based learning. Starting with an introduction and prayer followed by an immersive exploration of Secwepemc plant names, uses, and ethical harvesting practices. We will share plant maps and language prompts to deepen learning. Visit key plant sites, recognize important cultural keystone species, and reflect on seasonal cycles that guide traditional harvesting. Come ready to observe, listen, and share in this interactive experience that connects language to the land in meaningful ways!

3D. Creative Connections: Art & Language Explorations Robyn Tardif

Join us for a hands-on art workshop that explores the intersection of language and creativity. Designed for those interested in both personal expression and collective collaboration, this session will feature two engaging art activities centered around the theme of Kectels-Kuc. Each participant will produce something they can take home, and. working together, the group will collaborate on a larger-scale, community-based art project. Whether you're an experienced artist or a beginner, this workshop is a space to explore, create, and connect with others in a meaningful and artistic way. All skill levels welcome!

Janice E. Billy
Immersion Teacher

Janice E. Billy is the grade 2/3 immersion teacher at Chief Atahm School and also teaches in the adult proficiency program. For over 20 years she has worked with all ages of language learners, from children to adults. She is a well-known TPRS presenter and has the ability to bring excitement to teaching language through storytelling while still using comprehensible input. Janice also teaches an intensive TPRS course at our TPRS Summer Institute.
